Highlights include The Delph entrance to the 50 miles of underground coal mine tunnels, The Packet House, miners' cottages, lime kilns, old warehouse and probably the oldest surviving dry dock on a British Canal. <u>Wigan Archaeological Society.</u> We are able to offer places on our current dig which is on Toddington lane in Haigh. This Lane, although now only a narrow farm track, was once the main road from Haigh to Blackrod. We have already discovered evidence for the previous 18th century lane (which is shown to be up to 13m wide on early maps), but could it be the long suggested direct Roman road from Wigan to Ribchester - as mention in the 3rd century Antonine Itinerary. Our excavations and geophysical surveys will be investigating this very possibility.
